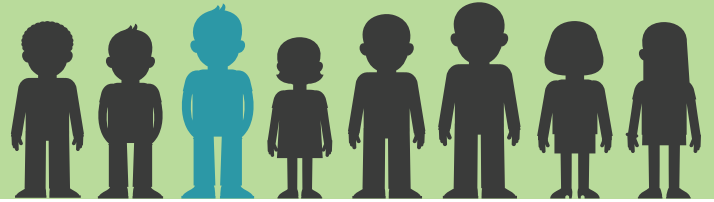


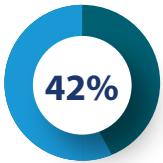
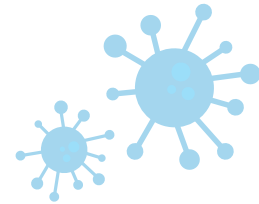


It's **Time** to end **HIV**

are unaware of their infection¹

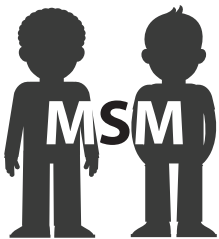


Approximately

in the U.S. are living with HIV today²

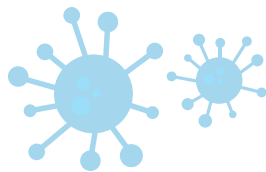


In 2018,

of new HIV diagnoses in the U.S.³

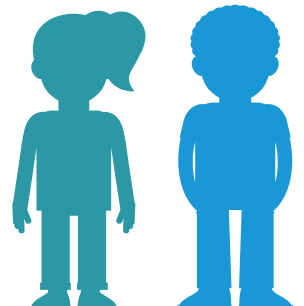
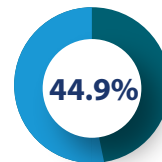
About **40% of new HIV**

Young people are the most likely to be unaware of their
infection. According to a 2018 CDC analysis, an estimated
44.9% of young people ages 13-24
who were living with HIV were
unaware of their infection⁵



Testing is the first step to diagnosis and treatment.

Screening for HIV can help link infected individuals to lifesaving care,
before severe virus complications develop.

Everyone ages 13-64 should be tested for HIV

CDC recommends that everyone between the ages of 13 and 64 get tested for HIV at least once as part of routine health care.

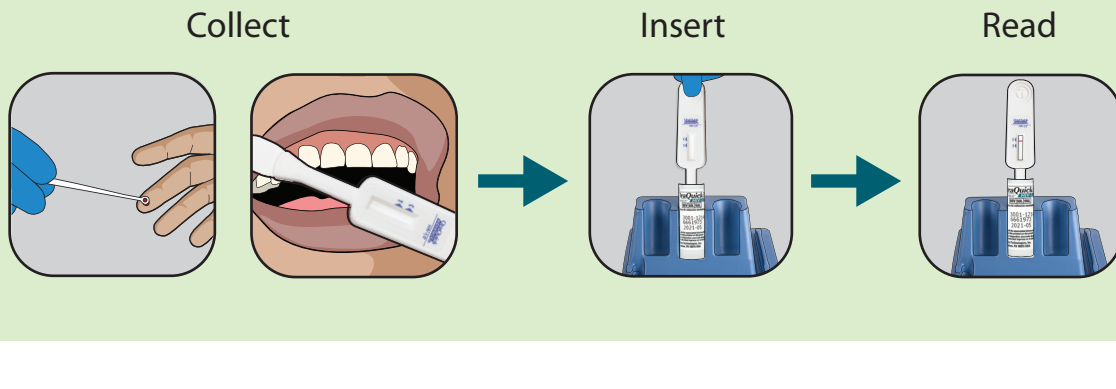
Some people may benefit from more frequent testing, including those who are ...

- MSM
- Having sex with an HIV-positive partner
- Injecting drugs
- Living with or have sought treatment for another sexually transmitted disease
- Living with or have sought treatment for hepatitis C¹
